

## COR — Building Men's Faith

Pope Leo XIV and the KofC promotion of Cor call not only the Knights but to the broader church to step forward to build their faith through prayer, study and community. While clearly we stand in challenging times on many fronts, there is a renewal of faith particularly on Catholic fronts. According to the August 14 Catholic Herald reports, "more Americans are joining than leaving for the first time in decades." "The Catholic Church in the United States is witnessing a remarkable surge in adult conversions, reaching levels not seen in over two decades," according to World's Catholic News.

Even on an anecdotal level in South Dakota, I am seeing a rise in the numbers of people who are approaching OCIA programs, and many parishes are seeing surges in the numbers, particularly of young people and young families. This past month at our Cathedral in Rapid City, with the start of the fall OCIA program, we experienced an abundant outpouring of attendees. We hastily added chairs and tables to accommodate the overflow demand - an unex-

pected but exciting experience. Earlier this month, I went with State Treasurer Jeff Gillen to New Haven and attended Cor training for State Evangelization and Faith Formation (EFF) Directors. Listening to the sessions and hearing from other State's leadership, it became increasingly clear what Cor has to offer our councils and parishes. Cor was created to respond to the emerging need to welcome young men to the faith. Its focus is three-fold:

- 1. To form men through quality formation programs.
- 2. To set the table for them to encounter the divine in prayer.
- 3. To build a Christ-centered brotherhood which will help to lead souls to Christ.

While this isn't new to the Knights, it has taken on a renewed urgency. We are all about service, far too many young people have been raised without a faith home or regular participation in faith. These young people are longing for something more. We have to realize that for whatever the reason. this generation will not show up for our service projects, our business meetings or even to church until they come to know the "who behind the why." Too many are finding the world's answers lacking, but the answer to all of the questions of the human heart are only answerable when one has an encounter with Christ. As the old Baltimore Catechism once reminded us. "We are created to know, to love and to serve the Lord to be happy with him in this world and in the next." So what these young men don't know, they won't love and what we don't love, we won't serve.

Through Cor, the Knights of Columbus meet men where they are yearning for faith, asking questions and seeking the Lord. In prayer and study, men will find what they have been looking for all their lives: Love, belonging, mercy, mission, hope, purpose and meaning.

Please consider starting Cor at your council for your parish and invite the future generations of men, who don't yet know Christ, to join our efforts. Once they knock and enter this door, they will then be primed to join our Order for faith filled fraternity and they will desire to serve Him all their lives.


## Traveling Icon and Cor

Brother Knights and Families,

How can we be better stewards? In the Gospel reading for today, the twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Jesus gives his disciples the poignant message that we cannot serve both God and mammon. The homily today was a great reminder to me that our stewardship is not just where we spend our money, but our gift of time and talents are equal parts of that stewardship message. We might want to spend our time scrolling on our phones or watching television, but dedicating our time to those activities is only service to mammon.

Our councils are in desperate need of your time and talents! I have yet to hear about a council event where the council is turning away volunteers because they have more help than they need. If we want to be good stewards, not just to our council, but to our children and to God himself, we must dedicate our time and our talents to doing the Lord's work and helping our brother knights serve our communities. I encourage each of you to help with a council event this year that you have never helped with before. More importantly, I want to challenge you to reach out to your Brother Knights and encourage them to be better stewards toward our councils. Remind them that setting a good example for their children makes them a better steward to their families and the sacrifices we make in the name of service bring us even closer to God.

Are you having a challenging time setting down the phone or turning off the television so you can focus on being a better steward? Do not worry, most people have that struggle. I

especially have that struggle! Recently, I found myself reading and reflecting on a bold book: The Power of Silence by Robert Cardinal Sarah. Cardinal Sarah is a great advocate for shutting off and setting down the ever-blaring devices that overstimulate our brains and can block out the voice of God in our everyday life. In this book he provides compelling reflections about his own time spent in silence and encourages everyone to spend more time in silence so they can be closer to God. Can you imagine the extra time we would have if we were all able to just put down our phones? Can you imagine the peace we might each experience in our souls if we could block out the information superhighway that rumbles through our minds each day? If you need help with this, I encourage you to seek out this book, find that silence that will bring you closer to God, and dedicate valuable time being a better steward to your own soul.

Finally, I want to leave you with a prayer. A prayer that I hope you can use when you are feeling lost or clumsy. A prayer to humble yourself before God to ask for his guidance to do His will. I carry this prayer with me in my briefcase, and I find myself saying at least one part of it every day. I especially find myself saying this prayer each time someone asks me to do "just one more thing" or help with "just one more event." This prayer helps me to not feel overwhelmed or overbooked, but to feel called by God and to help me listen to God. This prayer is credited to Fr. Mycal Judge who served as chaplain to the New York City Fire Department and was the first recorded victim of the terrorist attacks on September 11th, 2001. I hope it can help you be a better steward in your family, council, and community.

"Lord, take me where You want me to go, let me meet who You want me to meet, tell me what You want me to say, and help keep me out of Your way."

Wednesday evenings are an opportunity to hold an exemplification, while faith formation classes are going on. Once a date and location have

been set, ask eligible men in your parish and pastorate to join our Order and inform them when and where the exemplification will be held. Make sure you invite their families to attend and observe. Offer to pick them up and give them a ride. Plan for a brief time for fellowship following the exemplification. These things will all lead to a new member who is eager and excited to become involved in your council.

If it is not possible for a prospective member to make it to an exemplification, they can join online, as well as take the online exemplification. This is a valuable resource for helping men join our order and become better husbands, fathers, and Catholics.

If you are a new member just reading your first issue of The Crusader, and you know of a man in your parish or a Newman Club member you've met on campus who might be interested in joining our Order, ask him. If you're not comfortable with asking him, give his name to one of the officers of your council and they would be happy to contact him and offer the opportunity to belong to the largest Catholic fraternal lay organization in the world.

## The House of Mary Shrine in Yankton Landscape Renovation Project and Call for Support

#### **Brief History and Features:**

The House of Mary Shrine (Shrine) is located six miles west of Yankton, SD, along State Hwy 52 and sits on approx-

imately 45 acres of land. The Shrine began its development when Ed and Jean English purchased land bordering Lewis and Clark Lake in 1957 to build a home. A priest told them to "save a portion for God." In 1971, a group of individuals dedicated to Mary, called the Rosary Makers, began meeting monthly in a cottage on the property to make and distribute rosaries throughout the world.

They developed a plan to have three large crosses erected atop the bluff and later that year, they were inspired to develop a shrine to honor not only God but also his Blessed Mother. A committee met with Bishop Lambert Hoch, of Sioux Falls, SD, to inform him of the plan and the bishop granted them permission and offered his approval. Thereafter, they began calling this site "The House of Mary Shrine." Since 1971, the Shrine has grown and developed through work of volunteers and generous donations to become a prominent Marion Shrine in SD. Also, the Bishops of the Sioux Falls Dioceses have spiritually supported the Shrine.

A landmark feature at the House of Mary Shrine is the Chapel of St. Joseph, built in 1978 of rough hued lumber from northern Minnesota to blend into the surrounding area. In-

side, the rustic chapel houses the Blessed Sacrament. It is open daily for quiet prayer, meditation, and reflection. Other features at the Shrine include three giant wooden crosses atop the bluff, the original House of Mary, and a Rosary Way. The Rosary Way consists of a large 15-decade wooden rosary that winds through the trees. Additional features are the Way of the Cross, Holy Innocents Garden, Way of the Saints, meditation areas, Veteran's Memorial, museum, gift shop, statues, and more. The House of Mary Shrine attracts visitors from across the country and beyond. You may have seen our display tables at the Knights of Columbus 121st State Convention, April 25-27, 2025, in Sioux Falls, SD.

The calendar of annual activities at the House of Mary Shrine include; Easter Sunrise Service that recalls the stations of the cross along the path leading to the three large crosses at the top of the hill, May Crowning of Mary, candle-lite Rosary Rally in October, and Holy Innocents Vigil in December. Currently, priests continue to say mass on the third Saturday of each month at 8:30 am and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy is prayed prior to the mass starting at 7:50 am. Additionally, the Patriot Rosary is recited weekly on Sundays at 4:00 pm.

#### Landscape Renovation Project:

Over time, some of the original features have begun to deteriorate, despite efforts to maintain them, and need to be upgraded or replaced. One such feature is the Heart-shaped Rosary Pond built in 1975 and surrounding rock and mortar retaining wall. After the Rosary Pond began leaking, epoxy coating was applied and then a new liner was installed. Unfortunately, neither solution resolved the leaks." Also, the retaining wall and narrow sidewalk around the pond have

deteriorated. This is the area most people see first when arriving at the Shrine.

Given these unsuccessful repair attempts and the pond's prominent location, it became clear that a more comprehensive solution was needed. We have undertaken a major landscape improvement project to remove the rosary pond and surrounding retaining wall and sidewalk and replace it with a heart-shaped paver rosary walkway that is 6-foot wide. Inside the heart, there will be a triple-boulder water feature consisting of three large stones with water flowing over them to create a tranquil focal point. A boulder retaining wall will be installed behind the walkway. A rosary made of one-piece metal rods topped with beads connected by a chain will be installed along the inside edge of the walkway. The design retains the founders' initial vision for the rosary pond. The walkway evokes the rosary, and the overall shape symbolizes the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Additionally, the walkway will accommodate the elderly and handicapped. This transformation aims to create a more inviting and serene environment for visitors, encouraging reflection and prayer while minimizing maintenance obligations.

The areas along the privacy fence and around the Mary House will be re-landscaped with river rock, concrete edging, and attractive perennials. This combination will create a low-maintenance, visually appealing border that welcomes visitors to the Mary House.

The House of Mary Shrine does not receive financial support from the diocese; and the operation, maintenance, and upkeep are through donations and a dedicated group of volunteers. # KNIGHT A SPOTLIGHT ON KC COUNCIL ACTIVITIES AROUND THE STATE

The Knights of Columbus, Splitrock Council 13400, comprised from members of Risen Savior in Brandon, SD and St Rose of Lima in Garretson, SD, hosted the Punt, Pass and Kick in Brandon SD, during the School's Pig Skin Classic.

We had 59 participants, ages 7 to 12, boys and girls. Each age group for Boys and each age group for girls, the top three with longest distance received 1st, 2nd and 3rd place trophies.

Each participant punted the football, passed the Football and kicked the football, for accuracy and distance. The participants are penalized for how far off center the ball landed. The spot where the ball landed was measured for distance and the amount of feet off center was deducted. The overall distance minus accuracy penalties, for all three for Punt, Pass and Kick were added together to determine the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place.

Pig Skin Classic, is the first home football game for the Brandon Valley High School. The Pig Skin Classic is an all-day event for the community, with fundraising booths for the Athletic department and numerous games for the kids.

Punt, Pass and Kick was affiliated with the NFL. When the NFL ended their affiliation with Punt Pass and Kick, the Brandon Valley Athletic Boosters wanted to keep this event going as a local event for the Community as part of the Pig Skin classic but could not get help, so the Boosters asked the Splitrock Council 13400 to running the event. The Knights have been running this for the past four years.



# R A SPOTLIGHT ON KC COUNCIL ACTIVITIES Rapid City Eucharistic Procession

A Eucharistic Procession was held in Rapid City on June 22nd in honor of the Feast of Corpus Christi. Many priests, deacons, religious sisters, and seminarians walked the complete route of two miles from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Cathedral to Memorial Park, along with almost 500 faithful Catholics from eight local parishes.

Approximately thirty-five members from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Council 1489, St Therese Council 8025, and Blessed Sacrament Council 8844 of Rapid City and Our Lady of the Black Hills Council 7079 of Piedmont joined forces to help with and participate in the Procession as well as to feed the hungry crowd at the park when it was over.

Council 1489 was in charge of setting up the picnic tables and crowd control during the Procession while Council 8025 purchased the food and delivered it to the park along with the 800 hot dogs they grilled up. Both of these councils then helped Councils 8844 and 7079 with the
